# A Faith of Many Colors: Rice Mosaic Craft

Rice is a major agricultural crop of India and an important part of Indian cuisine. But rice can also help us learn more about the culture that William Carey shared the gospel in.

The people of India celebrate a festival called "Holi" to commemorate the end of winter, the beginning of spring, the love of the gods, and the hope for a good harvest season. Traditionally, children throw brightly colored powders at each other and adults smear dry colored pigments on their faces while participating in feasting and dancing. The full moon, one of the symbols of this holiday, signifies the beginning of spring. In Genesis 9, God gave Noah a sign of his love and covenant with his people: the rainbow. With this sign, he promises he will not leave us or forsake us. Since then, when Christians see the colors of the rainbow, they remember God's eternal promises to his people and the hope we have in Jesus.

Instead of throwing colors and celebrating things that will soon pass away, make this colorful craft to remind you of God's covenant to always love us!

### Supplies:

- 1 cup of uncooked white or brown rice
- 1 teaspoon vinegar


About 1/8 teaspoon Food Coloring for the colors of the rainbow Zip-up plastic bags or bowls and spoon for mixing the colors Glue

Follow the instructions on the next page to make this colorful rice mosaic.



#### **Instructions:**

- 1. Fill a zip-up bag with 1 cup of rice and 1 teaspoon of vinegar.
- 2. Scoop or pour about 1/8 teaspoon food coloring into the bag. You may need to mix colors to make all the colors of the rainbow (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, and violet).
- 3. Zip the bag shut
- 4. Squeeze the bag and mix the rice all around until the food coloring is well distributed
- 5. Add more food coloring to reach the desired color.
- 6. Pour the colored rice onto a cookie sheet. Spread it out to expedite drying time. To absorb the moisture and help the rice dry more quickly, line the tray with a paper towel or towel.
- 7. The rice takes between 2 hours and a full day to dry, depending on your climate and humidity.
- 8. Once the rice has finished drying, print out the rainbow template on the next page and glue the rice down in order of the colors of the rainbow as mentioned in step 2.







# Fabric Dying Craft

The production of indigo fabric dying can be traced back to the 4th century BC. Made from the leaves of an indigo plant, this fabric dye has been desirable all around the world. The country of India is a leader in the production of the dye! While William Carey was living in India, he served on an indigo farm. Follow the instructions below to make your own indigo dyed fabrics!



#### What you will need:

- We recommend purchasing this indigo dye kit. It will have everything you need!
- 5 gallon plastic bucket
- Long plastic stirring spoon
- Plastic pitcher with a gallon marker
- Pre-washed cotton fabric
- Plastic drop cloths or protected workspace
   Note: The dye will permanently stain all materials used. Plan accordingly!

#### Instructions:

- 1. Pre-wash your fabric so that it takes to the dye more easily.
- 2. Use clamps, rubber bands or twine to create patterns on your fabric. There are also many ways to tie the fabric to create a pattern after dying. For extra help, visit **this website**.
- 3. Soak your tied up fabrics in clean water until the dye bath is ready.
- 4. Prepare the dye bath according to the instructions on your kit. Be sure not to overmix to avoid getting the bath too oxygenated. Cover with a lid or plastic wrap for 15-20 minutes. Be sure to always use gloves when touching the dye!
- 5. When the bath is ready, squeeze out excess water from a piece of fabric and put it into the dye bath. Only dye one piece of fabric at a time, gently moving it around but not squeezing it. Let it stay in the bath for up to 5 minutes.

- 6. Squeeze the fabric under the dye bath and remove, letting it drip over the ground, not the dye bath. Let the fabric sit on the ground, in a bin or on a drying rack without taking any resistance bands or ties out of the fabric. It will look green as soon as it leaves the bath, but it will slowly turn blue as it oxygenates! Turn the fabric periodically so that all the sides are exposed to the air. Let the fabric dry for 20 minutes.
- 7. You may re-dip the fabric to achieve a darker dye.
- 8. Let the fabric dry for 15-20 minutes after each dip until you get to the shade of blue you desire.
- 9. Remove any ties or resistance bands and lay out the fabric to allow it to finish oxygenating.
- 10. Rinse in cold water until the water runs clear before washing and drying the fabric with gentle detergent. Dish soap can be a good option! Make sure all the dye has been washed out by rubbing the fabric against a white sheet of paper. If some color comes off, it needs to be washed again!

Enjoy your indigo dyed fabric! This craft is perfect for dish towels, napkins, or even pillows and pillow cases!
